- 6. To not let the sins and errors of the past curtail any of the good I am capable of doing in the future.



"For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways, saith the Lord. For as the heavens are higher than

the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways, and my thoughts than your thoughts."

(Isa. 55:8, 9)

I. CHOOSE YE BETWEEN THESE TWO TEACHERS:

- 1. God teaches that the Bible should be our guide. (2 Tim. 3:16, 17) Man teaches that we ought to have a man-made creed, discipline, or articles of faith, or something else.
- 2. God's way is right; man's wrong.
